LIFE SENTENCES FOR WOMEN?

On Wednesday 3rd September, LIFE an anti-abortion organisation, held its inaugral meeting in Belfast. The organisation has just been granted a room from the Belfast Welfare Society in Bryson House to run a counselling service. LIFE was formed in 1970 in Britain, its main aim being the repeal of the 1967 Abortion Act and opposition to abortion "root and branch". It has a long history of using emotional and horrifying tactics in its campaign. For example in the Midlands of England members of LIFE handed wreaths to women coming out of abortion clinics.


on her Wiltshire home. After pleading guilty, she was fined a desultory £110 (less than 40p, per plant), for possessing resin, the plants, and allowing her home to be used for smoking same.

The leniency of the fines may have less to do with Oaksey's view on hash, than the fact that Princess Margaret and her gardener friend Roddy Llewellyn, were frequent guests at the estate. Could Maggie be the first royal 'dope fiend'? If the fines were taken as a precedent they might have signalled a long overdue change in the spirit, if not the letter of the law as applied to cannabis offences. Unfortunately this is not so....take a recent bust in the less rarefied atmosphere of Antrim..... The drug squad, armed with a warrant and house-breaking paraphenalia stormed into the home of a 32-year old aircraft engineer. They found 6 grammes of cannabis resin and a set of scales. With no friends in court, in any sense of the phrase, he was duly convicted and received a staggering £300 fine and a 3-month recorded sentence. A sentence like this, little short of the maximum for possession, shows how local magistrates are determined to defend the lucrative trade of the socially acceptable 'drug pushers'... the brewers and publicans. The Northern Ireland Abortion Campaign and friends formed a picket handing out leaflets and information to the well heeled Malone Roaders, before the meeting started. We also attended the meeting and but for the persistent questioning of the speakers by NIAC, it would have been a much more boring and sanctimonious affair than it was. It was held in a Presbyterian meeting hall, the venue being changed at the last minute after the refusal of Queens University to allow them to use Queens Elms. It was a good choice of venue-the atmosphere toned in with the surroundings and at times it seemed that the assembled would burst into prayer and a few hymns. We were firstly lectured by Mrs. Scarisbrick, English chairperson of the organisation and then by three upstanding members of the Belfast community (one continued on back page



Once you're sentenced at four or five you face 2 terms of 6 & 7 years to run consecutively. The first six aren't all that bad because you have not really a notion of what is happening. Not that you ever do. In the catholic school they really start to shovel it in - the religion bit, that is!

Many things go on which may not be so apparent ie, intense conditioning in sex roles, so by the time you're out many sexual predjudices are like second nature to

And of course the conditioning does not stop at sex roles. The whole system is reflected in your education, which is reinforced in your activities outside prison. Until it comes to a point where you can't think of life being any different from what it is. Then you are ready to take part in society - most likely on your knees building for the priviledged, and then sweeping up after their destruction.

Of the two prisons I found grammar school the worst. I can sum up what it meant in 2 words - humiliation and torture. They tortured you into feeling insecure and unimportant. Of course the place was run by tyrannical, stupid, middle-class shites, the type that calls the provos terrorists. always looking for a pat on the head from the Master race, and who do their best to succeed in life by licking all the boots they can. Most of the people who attended my school were of the middle class, high IQ low intellingence bracket. Liberal shites that is what I had to put up with.

I never wanted to go to the place - why should 17 Why the fuck don't you catch yourselves on? Why do you think you are at the place ... to end up as a wee cog in their machinery, and what do you get fuck all!

Please note:

Do not cooperate with your school, Ignore all teachers when you see them outside school (they'll probably ignore you any way). Do not attend any school functions. Withdraw yourself from all school clubs. Do not sit up straight in class. Laugh at the teachers. Do not use the school library. When at dinners eat all you can and make as much a mess as you can. Do not buy any pens or pencils or any stationary -use old scraps. Wear your school uniform the wrong way round etc etc. OR... Better still, just do what YOU want.

A SLOW DEATH

Based on Margaretta D'Arcy's press conference after her release.

Enter Dr. Spence, a round, red faced man. his breathing heavy with the smell of drink. 'How are you this morning, ladies?' he chirps. There is no reply. And again, 'How are you ladies?' The 2 women lying on their beds in an empty cell, whose walls are covered in their own excreta and menstrual blood, don't respond. So he prods the ladies' and tries again.

Dr. Cole has a prosperous practice in Armagh town and regularly runs a surgery for the same 'ladies'. When they ask for treatment for heavy periods or cystitis, he gives them tablets and never examines them. You see its all in their minds. Women often exaggerate their pains and these women are particularly irrational. He tells them this

Marie Mc Clennaghan has black blood coming out of her back passage. She was in prison before and developed a lump on her breast. On this occasion she has discovered another one on her other breast. The doctors have not examined her for either illness.

Dolores Price, whose sister was freed because of her severe illness and is now still in hospital, is herself like an old woman. Her young body has caved in, her face sunken, her limbs are like sticks. Like many of the women she shuffles rather than walks. She is so weak she can't attend mass.

Pauline Mc Laughlin became so dehydrated from anorexia nervosa that her heart collapsed and was rushed to the City Hospital. Here 8 pints of fluid were pumped into her body. Within 24 hours she was back in prison and now regularly 'receives' 8 pints of fluid. This stops her from dying.

Mary Doyle is surrounded not only by her 'natural' waste but has constant attacks of vomiting and diorrhea.

The building is old, so even when the cells are steam-hosed, the cracks in the walls and floors are still dirty. The variety of insects reemerge from the skirting boards. There is no ventilation. The windows are boarded upand the doors only opened ajar by screws, never wide. The smell is too unpleasant, you see. The little air there is seems to be absorbed by the excrement. In a 24 hour period there is only enough energy for 11/2 hours. Even talking is exhausting.

There is not enough protein in the food to give energy, only enough to survive. If a meal is missed there is hardly enough energy reserves to keep going. The talk and daydreams are about food. All the time. Though there is quantity there is no substance and 5 minutes later the hunger pains start. They stay most of the day.

The guardians of this institution take home £280 per week. There are male criminals from Crumlin Rd. and male officers constantly on the wing. All the screws are lovalist in persuasion and their job is to guard the republican protestors. There is 23 hours tension of petty and degrading confrontat-

Most of these young women depend on the letters from and visits with their families. They live on the hope and security of their families support. Consequently the censors periodically stop letters going to or arriving from this source. About one third of all letters never reach their destination. The distress is only another weapon of the Northern Ireland Office.

The Law and the Peace People

The Peace People recently published a booklet called 'Rights and Responsibilities-A young person's guide to the Law and Emergency Legislation in Northern Ireland' by T. Foley and P. Graham.

When I first saw the booklet I thought 'Great! Its about time someone did something to let us know our rights'. On reading it I just felt angry. Fair enough it does let you know what the police and army can and cannot do (they can do whatever the fuck they like). Unfortunately the authors have a naive faith in the forces of law and (dis)order. This is shown in their treatment of the Diplock Courts. They say, 'The Judges also have a more difficult job to do, there are no juries permitted in many kinds of case ... and the judge is left to unravel the questions of the law (his normal job) and to make sense of the questions of fact (normally the job of the jury)'.

What I'd like to know is how the absence of a jury makes the judge's job harder when the evidence in 80% of the cases is based on 'confessions' and if the judge is a bit pissed off he can always find the suspect guilty (or just for the fun of it). The authors say that they are trying to make young people think about the law but they don't seem to have thought about it much themselves.

The booklet ends with a quotation from the Declaration of the Peace People. 'We want for our children, as we want for ourselves, our lives at home, at work and at play, to be lives of joy and peace'.

Halleluiah, Praise God and pass round the collection tray! But how are we going to achieve this?

Certainly not by tolerating the repressive legal system operating in Northern Ireland today and hoping that things will get better if we stick our heads in the sand and wait a few years.

We must abolish the control of politicians, bosses and priests and take matters into our own hands because only when we control our own lives can we be certain of living, 'lives of joy and peace'.

WHICH INVITES ARSON I If you happen to pick up a copy of the Sunday News' (Sept 14th), turn to partie and happen across an "The Women with harm."

ME ENLIGT IN THEIR YOUR TRANSPORT OF SHIPPES, WITH FENCES WENTERS "The Women who invite Rape", and read through it, you're entitled to do what your immediate reaction tells you to do. After all, due to the fire at the premise's earlier this year, theres only a fraction of the building left to go.

The article as a whole, written by an anonymous reporter by the name of Joan Boyd, with the aid of an RUC chief Inspector Jean Gallagher sets out to trivialise, condone, render irrelevant rape — blaming women for inviting it by walking in the streets, or going to the puls on their own streets, or going to the pubs on their own -socially unacceptable, how much safer they'd be locked up in a kitchen under the careful guidance of their husbands, who can legally (almost) beat them up at the first sign of dissent, rebellion against his authority as the owner (under law , a women is considered the mans property -if a women is raped, the husband may sue the rapist for damages against his 'property'), failure to comply with his desires, legalised rape marriage etc.

Official figures quoted say that the incidence of rape in N. Ireland has risen by 23% to 58 - "insignificant", according to the police - of course they don't take into account that 90% plus of all rapes are unrecorded, as most women are too terrified to report it to the police – to be put through the horrible experience of being treated like a piece of shit -laughed at, "sure your'e not making it up, love" (Rape - every womens fantasy) -ha ha degraded by police doctors, the final pieci of advice being " Don't go out at night".

The RUC spokeswoman, and they made a great deal of it being a woman, makes some startling revelations-

" Its very difficult to give women advice on what to do in the event of an attack its' not the case of women being jumped on at night , that kind of thing just doesn't happen" and

....many more girls pretend that they were raped because they do not have an excuse for being out late and are frightened that their parents will be angry'-its not even laughable....

Its no use just to criticize Joan Boyd as an individual as shes just another paid hack, pandering to the wishes of the feat ures editors and ultimately the owner, Colonel Richardson.

The article, in the most subtle of ways tries to equate the alledgedly "low" (on paper) of rapes with the rise of the paramilataries - leading the reader to believe that, as well as dismissing the problem of rape, the people concerned are getting their kicks another way -what conclusion does that lead to?

Like the rest, this is just another piece of shit smeared onto a piece of paper, by another bought and paid hack to be accepted by some and unnoticed by others -----who are they kidding?

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ARMAGH PICKET

On Saturday 30th Sept Women Against Imperialism staged a picket outside Armagh Jail to highlight the conditions of the protestors inside and also the ill health of Pauline Mc Laughlin, who is being refused any medical treatment because of her previous involvement with the protest.

Surprisingly there was a low turnout but that did not take away from the spirit of the picket as a whole.

A member of WAI outlined in brief a history of the protest for political status and the special case of Pauline Mc Laughlin. After this there were only two more short speechs — by Kevin Agnew, who was part of a contingent from South Derry, and by another WAI member. Then the picketers turned to chanting and singing which they hoped would be a great boost to the morale of the women inside.

During the picket the RUC spotted someone taking photos of them. They did not try to approach this person there and then, but waited until he had got on the bus and was about a mile outside Armagh. They demanded the photos under threat of arrest for so called 'collecting of information of use to terrorists' and also threatened to take everyone out onto the road and search them. So eventually the photos were handed over and the bus returned safely to

One should note that information can be just as easily got from the press, TV etc, ie. photos of RUC members and other likely targets. So what the authorities were really afraid of was the photos being presented in a certain way to discredit the RUC.

CARNSORE POINT

The 3rd Anti-Nuclear demonstration at Carnsore Point was quite unlike last years festivals in that it had a lot more 'political' content to it rather than the passive consumption of last year. As a demonstration it was a 'testing' of the anti-nuclear movement on questions like, support for it, solidarity within it, and new ideas coming from it.

SUPPORT

Firstly attendence was down on last year, a lot of people didn't come because there was not a festival, some because they thought that the nuclear debate had been ended/delayed by the lack of 'public' determination by the government to steam roll ahead.

A lot of people attended because they knew Carnsore is still very much a threat, because Uranium prospecting is taking place all over the sountry, North and South at the expense of the EEC who are desperate to get "their own" reserves, and because of the noxious industries springing up, where multi-national corporations are coming in to exploit the workers and if that is not bad enough to leave them decaying cripples along with the rest of the people who live in the immediate area of the factories.

SOLIDARITY

The Anti-Uranium groups have placed themselves outside the Anti-Nuclear Movement in that they see the campaign as being solely one of No Uranium Mining without Carnsore was productive for those who did get involved — the knowledge that we can achieve anything if we put our minds to it, that people with no apparent skills can build a large village with toilets, water, food, etc...Maybe more importantly it gives people time to get to know each other, to know who you can trust—which in the event of direct action against the nuclear station at Carnsore is all too important.

PUBLICLY widening the issues to nuclear power, waste, bombs etc.

The Donegal Uranium Committee (being the largest) does not wish to work with a movement which appears to tell them how to conduct the campaign — they are however prepared to work WITH people, not for them.

Those who have been campaigning on the issue of noxious industries have tried to encourage the involvement of anybody who who is interested — however groups and individuals within the movement have been slow or against widening the issues outside the nuclear cycle or else distrust working with Revolutionary Struggle who are initiating the campaign at present.

Splits and bad feelings do exist within the groups, individuals and organisations involved within the movement on a whole range of questions, on the campaign, strategy,etc in short, the anti-nuclear movement is not a movement in the sense of a coherent force.

NEW IDEAS

Because of this lack of support as well as partial support for certain issues, new ideas were not very forthcoming — if anything the splits, distrusts became more rooted, not exactly the mood for imagination and power.

Carnsore's future as a demonstrationfestival/discussion weekend etc. must be seriously thought about before it takes place again next year, if it does. Carnsore has lacked discussions on what the problems are in the locality and how best to get our message over or get the support of local people. If construction at Carnsore starts it is imperative that local support is on our side — and it will be too late if we wait until the government decides to make its move.

Carnsore 80 also suffered from low involvement of those who attended. Of the 40 different workshops, exhibitions, slides, film etc, few people actually participated with most just 'being there'. Carnsore also gives the impression that it had to take place because it happened last year. The weekend event was not necessarily the best strategy available — it was the only ONE in that the same energy/commitment would not have been expelled on any other activities.

This article is written by 2 visiting friends, one of whom was in Poland during the recent general strikes in the Gdansk region.

It is difficult to convey the complexities of the whole situation in such a short space, but we have some impressions and thoughts to share.

Poland has been dominated by Russian influence for decades with a totalitarian Party-State which controls all economic, political, and social life. In the last 10 years, as a reaction to a low standard of living and lack of freedom, there has erupted class confrontations and strikes. This summer, what started as a protest against meat prices, blossomed into a wide-spread strike movement for working class control over the economy and more freedom generally.

Impressions

I arrived at the Lenin Shipyards the day the Premier came for the negotiations. The 16,000 workers were in permanent occupation and the situation was really lively. Here was the government forced to come to Gdansk to talk to the strike comittee delegation of around 400 workers from all the main factories in the region, the whole thing relayed over loud-speakers to the 2 or 3 thousand outside the factory. The hatred for the party was clear. Everything the Premier said was jeered at. The people were quite cynical to promises of reforms that he was offering, confident that their strength and unity would force him to concede their demands.

In drawing up their list of demands, the strike committee included demands for more than just themselves as industrial workers. As a result, intellectuals and students came to offer help and support, for example bringing a duplicator for the workers' strike bulletins. Private farmers brought their food to the shipyards rather than the state stores. People from all over came to Gdansk to show their support and to get information, as there was no radio, press, or telephone communication.

LAND STRIKES

Inside, the shipyards was a no-go area and we were very lucky to get passes. The decision-making body was instinctively intended to be a workers council of rotating delegates. However, the structure and communications between workers and their delegates often broke down, but no one seemed very alarmed by this because there was a total trust of the strike committee, as fellow workers, to speak for them.

The strongest attitude was of class unity against the Party, but a deliberate vagueness as to what alternatives they wanted. Because of their intense hatred of the Russian state and its lies, they believed the more subtle propaganda of the West. They were surprised when we told them how our government and trade unions didn't speak for the workers any more than theirs.

As an ex-Catholic, I was dismayed at the strength of Catholicism. Everyone took part in daily mass. Such religious traditions, long suppressed by the State, won the support of the majority of people in Poland, and was eagerly capitalised upon by the Church.

Some Thoughts

Those involved in these struggles have won important victories, and gained a lot of confidence and experience of selforganising. This is just the beginning, and some of the contradictions are now plain — who should run society? What is the role of the Church? Is there any difference between Eastern and Western capitalism? Could their workers councils have seized control, if not for the threat of the Russian troops? What would happen if there were similar general strikes at the same time throughout the Eastern bloc . . . and the West? Will people, especially youngsters, take this opportunity to question and oppose their rigid family/sexual/religious upbringing? Will we learn from their unity and determination, and confront what oppresses us, which is a society increasingly totalitarian, crisis-ridden, and destructive?

The 1979 Annual Report of the N.I. Health and Social Services has just recently been published... dramatic headlines in the Belfast Telegraph, a few 'sensational' figures, and then forgotten. Media coverage. But what is actually going on? The state of our health, our bodies, remains undiscussed, a mystery, beyond our understanding.

Our health---our ability to enjoy ourselves mentally and physically--- has become an industry, with profits and factories, institutions bureaucrats and statistics,....and somewhere mixed up in it all are the doctors who dispense, prescribe, and push the little pills and potions which supposedly cure our ills. Last year there were 12½ million prescriptions in N.I.....8 for every person. A small decrease in the previous year, but overall quacks have been pushing more and more drugs at an ever-increasing rate throughout the 70's. One in every 5 drugs prescribed in N.I. is "a preparation for the nervous system".....in other words, 20% of the concoctions from our local health industry are chemical potions, designed --- NOT TO IMPROVE OUR BODIES --but to subdue our minds in order to continue our lives of distress. Truely, doped to cope. We are doped with nearly 800000 tranquiliser prescriptions in 1979 (no decrease here) and nearly 450,000 'hypnotic' prescriptions (which includes barbiturates). So what?

Hypnotics are manufactured for 'rapid sedation'...to put us to sleep. They are similar to alcohol in many ways-addictive, tolerance developes all too easily, unpleasant withdrawal symtoms, suicidal feelings etc. etc.. In short, a very unpleasant, anti-social pill to knock our bodies and minds out, so that the causes of our nervous state are never tackled. But 'barbs' work too well for the health industry... you cannot work, live, stay awake, drive, exist. Hence the recent medical moves to curb their expansion and shift towards tranquillsers—the infamous valium, librium and friends which have more to do with share-prices and advertising than our well-being. Over ¾ million prescribed doses in N.I. last year—the majority for women diagnosed as being in states of 'anxiety', 'depression', or 'tension'.

TL PUSHING

Apart from the physical dependence, the bad side effects, they work by childing into our central nervous system. Unlike parbiturates, they DO enable you to function as a zombie into day smodern society. Hence their increasing popularity with the establishment medical order. They are the perfect good citizen I drug for women (and men) wifting connect cope with creat housing, polluting-dangerous traffic, buge families and no facilities, aggressive husbands, inflation unemployment, army and police forces etc. etc. It's easy to see why tranquilisers are easy and cheap to get: it's easy to see why doctors prescribe so many so chen, it's easy to see the important role of the drug manufacturer in our 'modern world'! It's not so easy to greate the alternatives.

One of the many important points refised by the womens liberation movement is the importance and necessity of health-care and the lack of it fram our doctored institution. A knowledge of our bodies is the beginning of our health, and as an alternative to the iridustry of pills, bureaucrats, and commandments from the "Experts". Our health will ultimately depend on a changed beople-diented environment, (not in the interasts of commerce and carbon-monoxide), with people-dientated efficiency on good and plential wholesome food (not expensive, packaged, harmful rabbsil) with communities were people find it easy to care for each other (not lead the life of isolated, lonely mildivalus seeking relief through pills and alcohol)... Alongside these divillic notions, we need to regain an understanding of the healing qualities of many of the plants that grow freely around our country-side.

Our health depends on the changes we make ourselves... not on the directives handed down by 'experts' with a pill mentality.

Interesting figures have also come to light about the legal pushing of tranquilisers and barbiturates in the S. of Ireland. Like the North, the gleans, the favel of unemployment, the more pills pushed....hearly twice as high in the cities as in the country-side,many more women than men...and again as in the 'north', nothing is being done about it....yet.

of whom, the lawyer, had to be corrected on a point of law by members of NIAC)

We were appalled at the knowledge of one of the speakers who after 38 years at the City and Mater hospitals informed us that the risk of death to a woman was greater if she had an abortion than going to full term birth-statistics show quite the contrary, abortion when performed early in pregnancy (as most are) is safer than having tonsills removed. She also felt that with such marvelous technological achievements being made in the field of medicine no woman however serious and debilitating her illness should have an abortion, she could be kept alive until the birth, and the quality of her life afterwards was not looked into very closely by the speaker, nor was the current cuts in the National Health Service. The point is that it is marvelous that such technology is available to help those women who want to have children - it is giving them more of a choice but LIFE are intent upon denying women the choice not to go through that experience and the problems that they would face in bringing up a child.

After the lectures, the audience were "allowed" to ask questions. It was at this time that the meeting began to heat up. LIFE made it clear that they opposed abortion in all cases. For them the right of the child outweighed that of the mother. In the case of rape for example LIFE thought the woman should have to carry the child to full term birth, then they said that most women would "learn to love" the child, and not visit the "sins of the father" on the child. If of course that didn't happen — then LIFE would offer an adoption service. This was also their position on children found to have gross deformities and disabilities—though they forgot to add that these children would find it almost impossible in our society to be

adopted and would be condemned to life in an institution.

What had LIFE done on the question of poverty and the single parent—well that wasn't their province they said but Mrs. Scarisbrick added that £30.00 per week was "quite adequate" to fulfill the needs of a mother and child. She of course would know her husband being a Professor at Warwick University. This was also the woman who opposed the building of a nursery beside her home, presumably it might have brought the property values down!! In actual fact a single woman and child would receive around £21.00 if she were a householder, and her rent would be paid for her in full if it was within a prescribed amount.....Mrs Scarisbrick was misleading the audience who balked slightly at the prospect of living on £30.00 per week.

The audience was also misled as to the sort of accomodation that LIFE offered to women. Accomodation is for the duration of pregnancy and in first few weeks after birth. Their literature for Northern Ireland states that they are offering accomodation to unmarried women: they are completely unable to offer married women practical help, believing as they do in the "sanctity of the marriage bed".

LIFE were incapable of answering questions on sex education. LIFE begins at conception and they ignore what happened to get life there in the first place and the methods of contraception that would help to prevent unwanted pregnancies. Seeing as they do give their horror slide shows in schools (many teacher priests and nuns attended the meeting) one would think that this was a good opportunity to give young people contraceptive advice. Obviously they would lose most of their supporters, them being against contraception as well!!

What ITPE is fundamentally doing is trying to restrict the right of women to control their own bodies—what it wants in England is the end of legal abortion and so a return to the backstreet and consequently more deaths and ill health to women as a result. In Northern Ireland they are intent on seeing that the Abortion Act of 1967 is not extended.

Despite wide advertising in the local press and three TV and radio appearances LIFE could only muster an audience of 200 on Wednesday—but that shouldn't make us think that they are no threat. Those 200 represented some of the most powerful people in society here—the Church, the Law and the Medical Establishment. As such they need careful watching and opposition if abortion is ever to be legalised here. Women who believe that we have the right to choose whether to have an abortion should come forward. We need a strong pro-choice campaign.

This is an article about drugs.-ALL drugs, but more particularly those which some authority has declared to be 'illegal', and therefore must be 'controlled'...by them, of course. Little gets written about the drug laws, the drug industry, the 'drug scene' in Ireland.....instead we are constantly fed the platitudes that those drugs for sale on the open market are quite safe, necessary, or harmless to our well-being (i.e. all those numerous pills and remedies that the medical profession dispense at random). With other drugs, like tobacco and alcohol, governments are only too keen to let us decide for ourselves, as long as they can cut in on the take! Those declared illegal (and backed up by the agents of their law and their order) are portrayed as nothing less than the stepping stones through perversity and craziness, to addiction and a horrible death.It's all very clear-cut and 'scientific'....but somewhat removed from reality. There IS a 'drug problem' in this country, of that there is no doubt, but it has a lot more to do with successive governments, the law, those that enforce the law, the profit-making drug companies, and the many practices of a Western capitalist culture....collectively THEY are the 'drug problem'. And not at all the increasing number of people learning yet again to experiment and develop through the use of natural, organic substances.

BUT HOW COME REALITY SEEMS TO BE ON ITS HEAD?

Perhaps a bit of history will help explain why some drugs are illegal (any dealings carrying stiff prison sentences) whilst other 'drugs' become a multi-million pound industry. It's not, as you might think, somehow connected to our 'welfare'...but has much more to do with racism, imperialism, police-power, and ignorance.

All cultures, at all times, have 'turned' on to something whether for religious/mystical purposes or just pure enjoyment beyond beyond the norm of everyday life. The use of marijuana*, for instance, spread westwards from China from about 5000BC. S.American cultures have used various hallucogenic plants for centuries. It's not something recently invented by the western flower-children of the 60's! Marijuana first came to Europe following the interest in the writings of other cultures that occured during the Renaissance (15th.&16th. centuries)....the stems of the marijuana plant were invaluable for rope and sail-clothe, and played an important role in the mercantile trade boom. From George Washington to Queen Victoria, the very well documented medicinal uses of the marijuana plant were enjoyed.** In the West, though, it was largely confined to the aristocracy ... in the East, a part of daily life for all.

The 20th, century brought changes, the use of drugs such as opium, coca leaves, and marijuana from Eastern cultures began to play an important role in Western commerce: Britain, for example supplied China with Indian opium(derived from the poppy plant)...the government of the United States wanted in on the profits to be had. They instigated the 1912 Hague conference, an international government convention, to investigate all forms of natural drugs. The US government argued for world-wide illegalisation of drugs and control by governments. During the next 20 years various governments supported such illegalisation for a variety of reasons—and none of them for the benefit of the people themselves. S.Africa, Egypt, and Turkey were particularly interested in the outlawing of cannabis (marijuana or grass) due to the fear that its widespread use by workers and slaves would slow production; British trading interests were concerned about losing their grip on the opium trade in the colonies...but it was the US government, through the manufacture of drug-scare stories, who did most towards the eventual banning.

In the midst of the depression, jobs were scerce in the US. Unwanted and unemployed Chinese labourers became an easy target, and the illegalisation of opium (opium was favoured mainly by the Chinese) gave more credibility to the government-sponsored press stories like...'Chinese doping young American maidens to make them slaves' The US government were simply using opium to instill racism in the American workforce. It gave the unemployed an outlet, other than the government and the business interests, on which to vent their anger. Likewise with coca-leaves and its derivative cocaine...the Southern states resisted any black/white equality using the outlawing of cocaine to give credence to the lies about 'coke-crazed blacks raping young whites' etc. etc.. And all too often the racism and ignorance were believed, aided by the shock-horror presses. And likewise racism and business politics were behind the illegalisation of marijuana. Following the prohibition of alcohol in the 20's, marijuana became increasingly popular as an alternative, particularly with an influx of Mexicans looking for work... it was easier to deport Mexicans for 'illegal' marijuana use than to pay them welfare payments...so marijuana was banned also.

And Britain followed suit with the banning and control of certain drugs from 1917 onwards. (It was a mere coincidence that marijuana was included in these laws... Britain merely ratified an international agreement which included marijuana, but their prime interest was in the control and sale of opium.) The 30's, 40's, and 50's saw yet another turn in the 'drugs scene'. If racism and imperialist economics had been instrumental in forming the basis of our drug knowledge earlier in the century, it was the American narcotics squad which fed us our information thereafter. With alcohol no longer illegal in America, the Feds and G-men, who-had become an industry in themselves, justified their enormous power-base with a crack-down on the 'evils' of marijuana smoking, as always equating it with crime, subversion, and anarchy! And the media, as always, were only too happy to go along with it... (it sold newspapers!). The illegalisation of drugs, used for centuries by many different cultures, was never based on 'scientific fact', the medicinal and pleasurable uses never considered.... racism, imperialism, cop-power, and red-scares were at the foundation of our modern drug laws. No wonder that drugs and crime seem to be two of a kind...but more of that

Throughout the prohibitive legislation of the 20's and 30's, the international medical profession did nothing to counteract the blatant propagands-and for good reason. Any move away from hert al cures could only but increase the saleability of their 'scientific' potions, neatly packaged and marketed as cures for all our ills. That such cure medicine rarely worked stimulated better advertising campaigns, rarely better medicine! (and it was always a 'cure'.. never an attempt at tackling the various causes of illness and disease...it was much, much too difficult to 'market' that 'product'. Later in the 20th, century, as some people rejected the 'alien-culture racism' of international law, and were prepared to experiment with the ancient natural medicines and relaxants of the East, the legal chemical manufacturers began to find 'cures' for ALL our ills...and made it very profitable in the process. It became very big business, with illness and causes a mere side-issue in the race for profits, the research and development and packaging of the same old wonder drugs, the squabbling over patents, the massive advertising campaigns that accompany every new pill. The scientific establishment, with scientific advertising to gain our confidence, replaces and mystifies the whole notson of self-help, peoples cures and natural, herbal medicines. And controlled by a handful of international drug companies like Hoffman la Roche (of Seveso and Dioxin fame), ...a Swiss multi-national with an annual turnover of over £500m., but a very low turn-over of satisfied customers.

The success of the chemical drug industry is reinforced, not just by their massive advertising campaigns, but by the attitudes prevailing throughout the Western medical profession...always away from ANY degree of self-understanding, and towards the (predominantly male) medical hierarchy and the chemical fix only THEY can prescribe. Our bodies, our minds, our health are their possess ion; our mystery but their profit. 'Shoot-up and Shut-up' as SEDATION becomes the norm for the depressed, at work or in the home. Working-class women suffer most at the hands of these Quacks who prescribe twice as many sedatives for women as for men. Living in shit housing conditions, motor-ways running past their doors, heavily armed Brits running through their lives, nowhere for the kids to play, demanding aggressive husbands, women are DOPED TO COPE. The pseudo-sei-entific technical/chemical fix called LIBRIUM or VALIUM, the Hoffman Is Roche answer to 'anx-iety' or 'psychic tension'. The 'womens problem' is reduced to their inability to cope with their pre-destined 'natural' role! The 'scientifically-proven' wonder drugs of the 60's, 70's, and 80's become part of daily life, and never mind the physical as well as the psychological problems...(the bad side effects, the dangers during pregency, dangers of mixing with alcohol, the very real addiction problems...in fact, all the problems normally associated with 'illegal' drugs can be yours every time you visit the local doctor!). And if you don't consider THAT to be criminal, there's more read on. So, with a neat mix of racial prejudice and economics we end up with a series of dracion drug laws which scientists continually try to justify! Therefore when we think of drug laws we_ think of corruption, addiction, craziness and death...and that's how the law appears as our only safeguard for sanity. That it's not, hardly matters as long as enough people go along with THEIR way of thinking, consuming their horror stories in their daily rag. A beginning is, of course, to try a smoke for yourself. Their prejudices and guilt-trips are difficult to overcome, but hardly impossible. The consumption of organic, natural substances is only a crime because of the accumulated prejudice and racism that ends up as the Misuse of Drugs Act(1971)...and sentencing in the north of Ireland is particularly severe, not because of a greater 'drug problem' here, but because of the ignorance of the magistrates and judges who can never hope to understand the full use of the brain; and a DS always ready to justify their existence and penalise those they catch as vindictively as possible....aided by some non-entity from Queens University whose 'authoritative' article in the N.I. Legal Review convinces judges that a 'custodial sentence for a first offence is more common in N.I.'

So that's one aspect of the drug problem...but there IS a very real connection with crime that should not be ignored. As long as there's laws prohibiting the use of natural drugs-any law, any drug-there will be 'crime' as professionals take over for the money, whether Belfast, Dublin, or Columbia. At the end of March, Jim McCann, w was charged with possession of 1/2 a million pounds worth of dope, and possession of a pistol with intent to endanger life, walked free from the Central Criminal Court, after one of the most inept prosecution cases ever heard in Ireland. The whole bust from the beginning was shrouded in mystery with different versions of what happened that night on the Naas Road lay-by appearing in the local and national papers. Some contradicting others, just as garda evidence at the trial contradicted the most commonly accepted story that had appeared in the press at the time of the bust - a story that had come from the gardai, of course.

Certain events help explain the ease of McCann, a acquittal. The re-appearance of some of the Thai grass from the bust for sale on the streets of Dublin must have been part of the price of McCann's freedom (though one member of the gards has been questioned about this, the DPP has decided not to press charges). The other part of it would appear to be McCann's silence. In an interview with that scurrilous sexist rag the Sunday World after his release, McCann claimed that if the trial had con-tinued he would have had to make some tinue are would nave nad to mare some revelations about happenings at the beginning of the '70s that would prove very embarrassing to a 'highly placed politican'. The immediate reaction is to think of Haughey and arms, though the drugs angle should not be discounted. When the present southern drugs act was being debated in the Dail, Haughey fought it tooth and nail, particularly the bit that allows the DS to search houses, cars, yachts etc on suspleion and without a warrant. early in the '70s a drunken Sunday World reporter the '70s a drunken Sunday World reporter in Cork claimed that Haughey was one of the main men behind the importation of dope into Ireland. That the story was never printed has more to do with a fear of reprisals from Haughey, than with any lack of evidence. Many of Haughey's business deals have been 'shady' - such as his purchase of land in N. Dublin which was immediately rezoned for development, giving lately latel iately rezoned for development, giving Haughey a tidy sum.

The whole question of dope importing and dealing in the South brings in local and not oealing in the South brings in local and not so local maffa which run the scene. And thats how such bad dope hits the streets..., perhaps some dealers falling out accounts for the so-called 'supergrass' knocking about. This is just grass cut with 'angel dust' - a very powerful psychochemical which can hit some people in very bad ways. If also hit some people in very bad ways.
