There was a protest of 30-50 people in Liverpool in support of Mumia Abu Jamal, black ecological activist on death row in America. His murder has once again been put off - a new hearing may take place in the New Year. There will possibly be an action in Manchester see future Loombreakers.

In an entirely unconnected incident in Manchester the SWP held an "Anti-WTO" protest outside Lloyds Bank on King St. 30 of them stood outside for an hour chanting slogans and demanding the few passers by sign their petition to "Scrap the WTO". Then some of them went in. Then theycame out again. Some time later half a dozen of them sat in the road and blocked the buses until the Police came. Then they went home.

Trees not Skis!

Longstanding activist Chris Maile currently has the upperhand in the battle over the Xanadu retail and leisure development and the associated park and ride scheme masquerading as a train station - Kenyon Junction.

The Xanadu and Kenyon Junction public inquiries are running concurrently but it is accepted that they are intrinsically connected (the financial viability of Xanadu is seriously challenged if the Kenyon Junction does not go ahead). All the evidence has been heard in the Xanadu inquiry (including some from Manchester activists) and has been passed on to the Secretary of State. The Kenyon Junction inquiry however, has been postponed awaiting an adequate Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). This is thanks to Chris's hard work and a judge in Rochdale who ruled that a full EIA is required before a public inquiry for outline planning permission, so that the public may have access to it and make representations in an inquiry (this was in a judicial review of a planning permission in Rochdale).

The Xanadu site is a greenfield site within the Wigan wildlife corridor, next to the Wigan Flashes - a nationally significant bird reserve. The site is used as an amenity by residents of the nearby council estates. The developer, backed by the council, wants to replace this local resource with a 55 metre high ski slope, 2 hotels, cinema, nightclub, swimming pool, casino, retail developements, etc,etc,etc......

Shafting Shell

On the anniversary of Ken Saro Wiwa's death, executed for speaking out about Shell's destruction of the Ogoni lands in Nigeria, an action took place at a Shell station in Levenshulme. A banner was hung from the roof of the forecourt and both entrances blocked for an hour. The police arrived in a steady stream of increasing numbers culminating with an inspector without a sense of humour. After the blockade was removed, one person who was leafleting the arriving cars was told they were under arrest. They replied no, they weren't and made a swift exit. The police continued to make things difficult, arresting another leafletter. A group decision was made to turn around and say that unless they let this person go they would have to arrest us all. It worked and we all left together, leaving them engaged in the puzzle of how they were going to get the banner down.

Only Our Rivers Run Free...

On Tue 23rd of November two Trident Ploughshares activists (one from Manchester) were charged and imprisoned on remand for conspiracy to cause criminal damage to a nuclear submarine.

They were caught in the process of swimming towards a submarine at Barrow-infurness.

After nearly a week inside they were released and bailed to appear at later date

The Loombreaker

Two thousand Greater Manchester Civilian Police staff are to go on strike starting with a 2 hour stoppage on December 6 followed by a 4 hour walkout for December 13 and one of 8 hours on December 20 (maybe they finally realised they work for a

bunch of right wing facists).

CrimeWatch OK?

It seems that that people of Manchester have come up with a new way of advoiding CCTV cameras by stealing them. Around 15 CCTV cameras have been stolen from Manchester city centre in recent weeks.

Riotous Assembly

This December, the "mad, crazy Riotous Assembly of worried, impassioned angry people" focussed on the Millennium Bug. A speaker had researched various potential problems such as hidden computer chips, and believed the Government propaganda ("we've got it all sorted") is unreliable. In particular, the nuclear and military situation is worrying. Some people are stocking up on food... Lots of activism was discussed as usual. The next meeting on 4th January at 7.30 p.m. at the Yard Theatre (Old Birley Street, Hulme) will look at Spies for Peace and / or May Day preparation.

Birley Tree

In the aftermath of the felling of the Birley tree in Hulme, residents are going to court. The first court action is to get Barbara McGloughlin from the Hulme Partnership done for lying in court. The paperwork was served on her on Friday 19th November. The second involves a legal challenge against the call centre development planned for the Birley Fields, which has annoyed Hulme Partnership no end - they have to get it built by June to get the Euro cash.



Campsfield Fence-Bashing

Whether they fleeing persecution or poverty, foreigners do not have the right to enter this country freely. They are imprisoned on arrival, often for up to two years while the Government decides if they can stay. Campsfield House is a prison which houses 200 refugees. Demonstrations have been staged monthly over the last six years, where solidarity groups have attempted to communicate with people inside and prevent deportation. On the 6th anniversary of protest this November, Manchester people joined groups from all over the country.

Uniformly clad in multicoloured butterfly masks (?), with the banging of saucepans drowning out the feeble salsa sounds from a small yellow stereo, they did a circuit of the formidable fence, flying balloons and banging their disapproval into the 12 foot metal sheeting. Unfortunately, the fence didn't budge, so none of the ambitious Plan Bs were put into action. This outer fence is reinforced with metal sheeting so inmates can have no sort of contact with protesters bringing messages of sympathy and objection. On this occasion, ballons were sent up (if you had enough: think James and the Giant Peach!) and paper aeroplanes thrown.

There was also the racket of everybody kicking the fence until the police started dragging people off. Despite the heavy police presence there were no arrests, and hopefully the people inside could hear that they are not unwelcome for the people of this country.

Marks and Spencer de-briefed

On the openning of the largest M&S in the world in Manchester, the largest pair of pants appeared, inscribed with 'Pants to GM cotton', together with 15 'Superheroes against GM pants' brandishing rather large Y-fronts and GM free underwear fetishes. This was one of the first actions to kick start awareness about GM cotton, which is not segregated from conventional cotton and is in most cotton clothes. Captain Yfront said 'its not just about food scares. GM cotton will increase corporate control and chemical use, and will threaten biodiversity - all for unnecessary technology.'. M&S responded by saying 'we haven't taken GM cotton out of our products because our customers haven't asked us to'...so its time to cotton on, and get asking. GM cotton briefings (scuse the pun) and ideas for action available by post (via Mcr EF) or e-mail <cotton @equinox.freewire.co.uk> and some rather fetching large pants and banners are available to spice up any action. America is the largest exporter of cotton, the largest producer of GM cotton, and Monsanto has a monopoly on GM cotton. Farmers have already experienced difficulties with it, so if exports are not guaranteed, they could abandon it altogether.

Bonfire Free Party

Hulme's Birley Fields came alive to the sounds of tekno. fireworks and crackling wood as Hulme's residents enjoyed fireworks night organised by Counter Culture Collective. There was a twist to the usual celebrations, with the guest of honour, Guy Fawkes himself, magically appearing on stage to judge the effigy contest. Babs McLoughlin (responsible for the massacre of the Birley Tree) and the Houses of Parliament won the battle to unceremoniously chucked onto the bonfire.

of the revellers Most congregated around a bonfire outside the Okasional cafe marquee and next to the Substance soundsystem with the beats that made ya giggle. The cafe provided luscious mulled wine and a wide assortment of cakes. Dancing, talking and running loonies across scorching hot wood carried on until late into Saturday morning with everyone wishing for the same next year.

Old Trafford Party

The Old Trafford limboland of industrial decay rumbled with techno and dancing feet as a HUGE disused warehouse was transformed by the Lysophanic and Substance soundsystems into a free party of epic proportions. Lack of lighting meant getting nose to nose with people before being able to recognise them (not always a bad thing!) The crowd numbered a few hundred, most happily gurning away, either near the music, or around a fire that had been built inside! A great idea for keeping warm but mildly asphixiating after a few hours. Mesmerising jugglers amazed onlookers with their skilful antics, and the party continued into the morning without police interruption.
