

Tub-thumping!

Around forty people disrupted the full council meeting, at which the council voted to close Gorton Tub swimming pool on 13th September. The meeting was delayed for half an hour due to noisy protests from the campaigners, who have put up a strong fight against the closure of this valuable local resource.

Councillors totally ignored the wishes of local people, who have in recent weeks stepped up their well supported campaign to keep the tub. They had presented a petition with 4,500 signatures, held public meetings, and had two fun days at the Tub attended by over 1200 adults and kids. At the end of last month, 60 pool users blockaded the entrance to the Commonwealth Games Stadium for over 2 hours, stopping traffic, and disarming the police entirely, as they did not know how to deal with the diversity of local residents involved.

Campaigners voiced their anger during the council meeting, when before the Gorton Tub item, they had to listen to a big presentation about the Commonwealth Games, discovering that Manchester City's (that is the taxpayer's) contribution to the Games will be £45 million. Yet the Tub was to be closed for savings of only £70,000. As usual, the opinions of local people were blatantly ignored, and the meeting gave the go-ahead for immediate closure. Immediate indeed, as the pool was closed that very afternoon, after the meeting, possibly to forestall any possible protests. 15 campaigners got to the pool, but were manhandled out of the way by the police.

Tony Martin Chair of the Campaign to Save Gorton Tub said "Today the council in the face of overwhelming community opposition have chosen to close Gorton Tub. They have not mandate to do so. The real democrats in this city are the ordinary people of Gorton and their like. This council represents the interests of the rich backers of the commonwealth games and not the ordinary people of east Manchester. The closure of Gorton Tub, for a saving of £75,000 whilst hundreds of millions can be spent on the Games is an absolute disgrace. We are not going to let them get away with it."

Campaigners are meeting as Loombreaker goes to press, to decide how to take their fight forwards. In the words of Chumbawumba from their rather aptly named song 'Tub-thumping' - "we get knocked down, but we get up again"

DSEI Arms Fair - Manchester people samba in the face of arms dealers

The DSEI (Defence Systems & Equipment International) arms fair saw a great turnout of Manchester people ready to show arms dealers from around the world exactly what they thought of them. Around fifty activists dressed in carnival colours with a samba band, joined a crowd of around two thousand demonstrators. The government chose the right place to stage the event - the EXCEL building in the heart of London's docklands was away from public eyes, sited between a railway on one side and the Thames on the other and ringed by fencing and cops on all sides. The idea had been to blockade road entrances into the building with a mixture of tactics ranging from street partying samba bands, to sit down peace protestors to padded up 'wombles' in white overalls.

Manchester's planning was thrown in to confusion early on when police encircled our meeting point and began stopping and searching people. We scattered into the surrounding council estates but were later able to regroup around the samba band. At this point the centre's West entrance had become blocked by the majority of the crowd but the police had neutralised their effectiveness by encircling them into a tight area. Taking the initiative the Manchester band rallied a group of around 50-100 demonstrators. Avoiding police attention we headed through the council estate, and made for the centre's east entrance, our

numbers swollen by hoards of local kids! After a cat and mouse chase we settled into a superb spot, outside the centre's tube station and in front of a delegate hotel. Passing arms dealers were reminded in no uncertain terms about the despicable nature of their business and police eventually had to move in to protect them. Interestingly, of the number we saw none tried defend the sick business they profit from, preferring instead to ignore our taunts. After holding the position for over a hour we headed back to the West entrance and met up with the London 'Rhythms of Resistance' samba band to indulge in a bit of a street party before heading home.

Anti Fascist Round-up

Police seal off Burnley! .

The National Front were due to march in Burnley on 1st Sept, & a few of us went off there to protest. At the meeting point in Colne, outside Burnley, we discovered that the police had cordoned everyone in, to prevent them going to Burnley. Ordinary people walking over to or find out what was happening, also found themselves trapped. All political activity in Burnley had been banned-including rallying and leafleting. Police were on every roundabout & motorway junction in the area, stopping any group of people in cars and minibuses to check for activists, turning them around, and even escorted one group back towards Sunderland where they had travelled from.

Despite being a beacon in our yellow minibus, we did manage to get into Burnley, but it was crawling with police. We couldn't find any other anti fascist demonstrators, or any fascists (though it was hard to tell, as this is a football-crazy town on the day of England v Germany, and we had no leaflets or info. We did gather some contacts and information for future actions. Apparently, other people succeeded in leafleting areas of Burnley despite the police.

We decided to do an action at a McDonalds to use our time fruitfully, having the van 'break down' in the drivethru, blocking it for 30 minutes Meanwhile, two others gave out Anti Nazi League leaflets to customers in McDogfoods. It shows how touchy the cops (and businesses) were in Burnley that day, as they turned up with a riot van and two cars to catch the naughty leafleters. The van was searched, and all of us were hassled It was interesting to see quite how stupid coppers are, because they put on the documents that the van was being searched to find ANL (Anti Nazi League) leaflets, which had been given out by a BNP (British National Party) member! Duh!

Police Protection for Nazis

A similar story emerged from Welshpool in Wales, where the BNP was holding a summer gathering. Police prevented protesters from reaching the site by stopping their transport, searching occupants, and generally hassling everyone, including ordinary shoppers by random stop and searches in Welshpool. Meanwhile in Oldham...

... more leafletiting was taking place. Around 200 ANL people set about leafletting all the homes in the two constituencies where the BNP had stood in the general election. Activists from the local community were supported by groups from as far afield as North London and Bristol. People split into groups of 15-20, coordinated by locals who knew the areas. By the end of the day most

households had received a leaflet explaining that the BNP are not the respectable party they pretend to be, but are in fact Nazis led by people with a history of violence and Holocaust denial.

As well as communicating the message to most people in Oldham the activity helped boost the confidence of local activists and inspired others to organise similar activities within their communities. The days event also dealt a blow to the handful of BNP thugs, all four of them, who tried to intimidate the large group of antinazis but failed miserably.

Local activists are now preparing for a massive carnival to unite the people of Oldham on Saturday October 20th.

The October Blockade

Earlier this year, 1000 people findleding about 36 from Manchester) joined a blockade at Fastane nuclear submarins base, managing to close the base for over 5 hours. On Monday 22th October there is going to be another mass blockade of the base.

Fastane is where Britains 4 Trident nuclear subs are based. Thoant is an indisorminate weapon of mass destruction designed to destroy whole office, and innocent cryllians. Nuclear weapons are the ultimate tool with which the large countries threaten the world, and torce compliance with mair way of life, will globalisation. Britain and Americs defend their possession of nuives by claiming they are defensive, yet they say they would use them where national interests are at stake you can bet that if push came to shove its the profits of their biggest companies that would count as "national interests"

The October blockade is being organised by CND (Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament) and by Indent Ploughshares, a group which has over the last few years, organised a concerted campaign of direct action against the nuclear system. 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FLOODS AHEAD

Last month, newspaper headlines not only hid the truth of what was going on in Genoa, but kept the say we need between 60-90% reductions in carbon dioxide emissions if we are to survive — governments agreed in Germany, in effect, to under 2%.

If committing global suicide wasn't enough, the agreement included the creation of new markets for pusiness (who create the problem in the first place!), trading 'carbon credits', building dangerous nuclear plants in far-off foreign countries to avoid any change in lifestyles 'at home' in the West. International Monetary Fund infrastructure projects — forests don't save us in even the medium-term food travels, is excluded from any agreement, and so on and so on. The Small Island States of the globals, unseasonal storms and other weather chaos weren't enough of a warning.

So what action are people taking, apart from buying the odd energy-efficient lightbulb?

During the negotiations in Bonn, people climbed cranes, disrupted plenaries and press conferences during the COP 6.5 conference, visited the delegates hotels, built a lifeboat, marched, went on noise demos, and held a critical mass bike ride and a street party.

In Britain, people visited US embassies, mothers & prams marched on Esso HQ after leafletting in their town centre, and held critical masses, street theatre and workshops. The Esso HQ was hit twice more, once by Greenpeace activists locking themselves to the road in a metal container, another time by people with tripods, climbers sitting in the tops of them to blockade access to the site for 8 hours. The boardroom of the British Airport Authority was also occupied in protest at the huge expansion of air travel being pushed by government and industry in this country.

Shell Animal Testing Fuels Protest

Mega-oil giant Shell came in for some more flak in early September when a coalition of animal liberation protesters bought their Stanlow refinery to a halt. Starting from 5:30am lines of people blocked all roads in and out of the site, locked to each other and to concrete-filled oil drums to stop the police from moving them. As well as destroying the environment with car fumes, drilling in nature reserves and waging a terrorist war against the people of the Niger Delta. Shell test plastic packaging materials at Huntingdon Life Sciences (HLS). The PVC 'plasticates' are a by-product of the petroleum industry...and the by-product of this, is that campaign against Huntingdon's animal cruelty focussed on Shell. HLS have been hard hit by the long protest campaign, which has seen many demonstrations, not only at HLS, but wherever companies support HLS.

Stanlow refinery, in Ellensborough, north Cheshire, was where the fuel protests first happened. Press attention for this event was tiny, considering that the animal liberation movement actually stopped all oil tankers coming in or out, whereas the fuel protest movement merely parked outside and offered the tanker drivers vague threats (or not, depending on who you believe).

Anyway, by the late afternoon the police were starting to drag people away and there were eventually twenty seven arrests. Again, we can compare this with how few fuel protesters were arrested. We were charged with 'secondary picketing', an offence under the anti-trade union laws brought in to prevent people acting in solidarity with strikers. In the station the desk sergeant said 'Do you wish to say anything regarding your arrest?' I thought of saying 'I blame Maggie Thatcher,' but you never know about the sense of humour of those sort of people.

The Guardian: Promoting negative attitudes towards disabled people

Two Guardian writers have offended disabled people recently, and in response the disabled people's Direct Action Network (DAN) held a protest against the Guardian at their Manchester offices on Deansgate. Simon Hoggart wrote on August 25, 2001 that he did not believe there are many disabled people around or else he would see us 'by the dozen' on every train or aeroplane that he is on He seemed to forget that there is rarely more than a single seat available for wheelchair users, that most disable people are not wheelchair users, and that sheer poverty also prevents many people unable to work from travelling by plane or train. But The Guardian did not let ignorance stop him having column space

Poll/ Toynbee believes that disabled people should be helped to die or not be born is the first place (Aug 22, 2001 and Aug 24, 2001). This supports the idea that our lives are not worth living. Disabled people telieve that women should be given accurateinformation and not feel pressurised into having an abortion based on misinformation and the prejudices of non-disabled people. Polly Toynbee also remarked disapprovingly that 'Disability campaignes have over-identified with other civil rights ssues' (24th August) Clearly, she believes that disabled people, unlike other civil rights campaigners should not be so 'strident'. Disabled people have a right to demand equality, alongside other groups who face discrimination and unequal treatment in society.

Asylum Seekers - Protest against forced dispersal

Protests against forced dispersal of asylum seekers are gaining momentum in the northwest. Following mass refusals from asylum seekers to get on the coaches, and a sit in by asylum seekers in a Liverpool hostel, dispersal has now been halted to Oldham and Glasgow. On Monday 20th August, twenty protesters from the Manchester Committee to Defend Asylum Seekers assembled at the dispersal point to stop the weekly coach used for forced dispersal. The bussing has now been temporarily suspended, and most asylum seekers are no longer to be dispersed outside of Greater Manchester according to a spokesperson from Refugee Action in Manchester However some asvlum seekers are still forcibly dispersed, and have their vouchers withdrawn when they refuse to be moved. One asylum seeker asked the rally, 'Why, once we live in a community and start to become settled does NASS then disperse us elsewhere?' The dispersal policy is designed to prevent asylum seekers becoming settled and so undermine building anti-deportation campaigns with local support Sympathetic local TV coverage has encouraged campaigners to continue the protests until all forced dispersal are stopped.
