

FREED TRADE HALL

On Saturday 2nd of Febuary Manchester's Free Trade Hall was taken back into public use, albeit briefly. Furious at the council's decision to sell this historic public space, demonstrators occupied for three hours and banners were unfurled protesting at the sale and demolition of the building.

On the site of the infamous Peterloo Massacre, the Free Trade Hall has a unique place in Manchester history. The building itself was founded in 1840 to house the great Corn Law debates of the 19th century and to provide space for Manchester people to hold political, religious and cultural public meetings. Since then, it has been the scene of Suffragette meetings, the famous electric Bob "Judas" Dylan gig. the Sex Pistols gig that inspired Joy Division to form and much more. The Manchester Corporation bought the Free Trade Hall from the Manchester Public Hall Company in May 1921, "so that the Hall should not be lost to citizens". Yet more recent times has seen Manchester Council's attitude change.

The Council claims that if there were any sale agreement committing the building to pubic use it has been 'mislaid'. Despite massive opposition from the city's Civic Society, the council has sold the building on to a private developer to be made into a £45 million luxury hotel.



Beyondtv is an independent media project starting up in Manchester. It's an open publishing site where activist and independent reporters can post up news stories that you don't see on the news. Beyond TV will train campaign groups to maximise the communication possibilities of the internet and low cost video production.



The occupation of the Free Trade Hall was timed to tie in with opposition to capitalism around the world. The same weekend saw huge demonstrations in Munich, New York and Buenos Aires. In Munich nearly 900 people were arrested for protesting as more than 7000 people took to the streets to disrupt NATO's annual meeting. In New York almost 20,000 demonstrated against the World Economic Forum, with 40 arrests. In Argentina there was a huge "casserole" demonstration, with thousands of demonstrators beating pots and pans in a noise demo in the Beunos Aires' main square.

For Peat's Sake!

Some of Britains most diverse and yet rarest habitats lie within peat moors. They are also some of our wildest and most beautiful places, yet they are being destroyed and turned into profits for a few American shareholders. Scotts, a huge US multinational agribusiness, is trying to strip the last few layers of this habitat and turn it into gro-bags. People from Manchester have joined the national campaign 'peatalert' to force Scotts to pull out.

There have been many visits to Thorne and Hatfield Moor in Yorkshire to dig ditches and build dams to hinder the works and a few large tresspasses on the site. On 18th Feb there was a national day of action against Scotts, blockading all their offices, factories and peat works in the country.

This is just a foretaste of the big 4-day blockade at the Yorkshire moor from the 25th March. The campaign is well cordinated with local wildlife trusts and environment groups and there will be further tresspasses and work stoppages till Scotts curl up and die....

Housing Office Occupied

"Things are going well - just maybe Manchester City Council are going to back up their grand claims with homes! One is a good start. If we don't get a plan to house everyone, we'll be back." Claire Lewis.

Around 30 disabled people from the Disabled Access Network (DAN) occupied Burnage housing office on Westcroft Road for 55 hours in protest over lack of suitable housing for disabled people. They left only once the council had an injunction against them.

Claire Lewis is a wheelchair user who has been on the waiting list for a ground floor flat for five years. Manchester City Council repeatedly told her that there were no vacant ground floor properties. However they then closed down their ground floor housing office. Not wanting to miss an opportunity Claire and other DAN activists took advantage of this newly vacated ground floor building, occupying it.

They demanded a meeting with the housing director, which they got within three days of the demo and an accessible home for Claire and her daughter who also uses a wheelchair. Claire has verbally accepted an offer of a ground floor flat on condition that the council carry out necessary repairs and alterations to make it fully accessible.

As for the most challenging part of the DAN demands, they are still waiting to see if the council will agree to a plan and necessary tools to re-house all the disabled people waiting. DAN won't back down on their demands; "A few tweaks won't do. It needs a real plan looking at the problems and planning a tangible end to them."

New A6 Protest Site

Last November a protest camp was set up in Elvaston Park Coronation Plantation, in Derbyshire. The camp is on the site of a planned A6 bypass. Protesters are living up one of the big oaks (lots have already been cut down), and are in need of more people, as well as donations of food, warm and waterproof clothes and equipment. At the moment there are approximatly 10 people living on site.

The Highway Authority have recently moved onto the site – claiming they're building a new newt pond. Quite why they need 2 mobile caravans, metal fencing and floodlights to build a newt pond has yet to be explained.

Alka-Belter

With the Genetically Modified Organism industry reeling, German heavyweight Bayer have weighed in to the fray, buying the research arm of failed Dr Frankenstein Aventis, thus making them the biggest GM research company in these islands. As Bayer recently launched on the New York stock exchange, activists from around the country (including Manchester) blockaded their Newbury HQ.

Beginning at about 7:40am, roads leading into the staff car parks were blocked by two ten foot tall tripods (with a person dangling from them), and a line of six people with their arms in tubes, forming a human chain between lamp posts. Dressed smartly, some of the protesters managed to enter the building. Others managed to lock themselves together within the revolving doors at both the main entrance and the rear doors, making further entry into the building difficult. Banners were hung saying: 'Bayer get out of GM crops' and advertising the new campaign's website. Throughout the action, leaflets were handed out to Bayer employees and to passers by in the nearby high street. At about 11am the blockade ended as planned and everybody left together. There were no arrests.

Bayer's past activities as a bloated capitalist banality-machine have included patenting the formula for Heroin (1900) and forming the company I.G. Farben (which propped up the Nazis, used slave labour and manufactured the Zyclon B poison gas used in death camps such as Auschwitz).


A minibus of assorted reprobates from Manchester battled the rain-soaked, wind-battered motorway up to Scotland last week to take part in the Trident Ploughshares big blockade of Faslane nuclear weapons base. As the blockade was a 3 day event this time, there were less people there on the first day, when we took part, yet there were lock-ons a plenty, and over 100 arrests.

Having re-read the blockade's non-violence guidelines, which demanded respect to everyone, including therefore police, military, and intrusive media, I felt that I

couldn't trust myself to show respect to any of the aforementioned. I also value anger, and the right to defend myself and my friends physically if necessary, so disagreed with the guidelines, and decided not to take part in the action as a result. I played a support role, but as I respect the right of the organisers to set guidelines, didn't want to find myself in a situation in which I either flouted these, or had to compromise my own politics and feelings to avoid flouting them.

The blockade was successful in that we closed all gates to the base for at least 3 hours, and for many it was an inspiring experience - for many the first time they had refused to do as a police officer says, their first arrest, supported by a well organised network right up to court and trial. As I write this, the 3rd day of the blockade is underway.


"We hereby declare that we will continue to serve in the Israel Defense Force in any assignment that will serve the defense of the state of Israel. The assignment of occupation and repression does not serve that aim - and we will have no part in it."

Almost three weeks ago, 52 officers signed a public petition denouncing the occupation and refusing to take part in it through military service. Police Brutality at Sellafield

Following on from recent peaceful antinuclear protests in Plymouth and at the Faslane submarine base, around 200 peaceful protestors staged a blockade of the two main gates at Sellafield nuclear power plant on Thursday 14th Feb. Despite informing the authorities of their plan to protest, and three previously peaceful demonstrations at the plant, people were thrown to the ground, and police caused injuries as they tried to pull obviously chained together activists apart, while arresting those trying to intervene. The gate was blocked for three hours. Legal actions are being considered against the police.

Colin Davies, pioneer of the Dutch Experience cannabis cafe in Stockport appeared at Manchester Crown Court on Feb 15th to have his case adjourned until June. He is still refused bail so by the time he appears in court he will have been confined to a prison cell in Strangeways for seven months, all because he has stated that he will continue to supply marijuana to people with medical needs. Colin is also denied the use of marijuana to alleviate severe pains relating to spinal injuries. Instead he is being supplied with morphine, so that's alright then.

About 40 people turned out to support Bayo Omoviola before an adjudicator in his application to remain in the country (see Loombreaker 25). Unfortunately the case officer for the home office had laryngitis and the case has been rescheduled for March 22nd. On February 15th a dozen people held a protest at Dallas Court "Reporting Centre" in Salford. Asylum seekers living within a 25 mile radius have to report at the centre on a monthly, weekly or sometimes more frequent basis as part of their conditions of asylum. Dallas Court is run by notorious private security company Wackenhut, who also run prisons for profit, mainly in the USA but elsewhere in the world as well.

Moment of Sanity on Market Street

In January a group of innocent bystanders were forced to reconsider the meaning of democracy. After 'careful' consideration of tactics the police stopped six people handing out leaflets and petitioning for support for the picket of the Israeli embassy on 26th January.

As police spokesbloke PC Scratchings explained "I have been concerned about the undermining of democracy in this country for some time. Luckily, we were able to threaten this group with arrest on the basis of one complaint from a member of the public. Even better, we deliberately refused to say why their behaviour was offensive or to be more specific about which particular public order offence they were committing."



The Loombreakers were Lancashire weavers who, in 1826, smashed the machines that were destroying their livelihoods and communities. The Loombreaker comes from the Free Information Network tradition, spreading news the mainstream media won't print.
