

The people who have produced this paper are a group of anarcho-syndicalists who all work in the transport industry. We want to break down the divisions between rail and tram and bus workers. We all have the same boss - the State Transport Authority - we need to organize together.

WE DO NOT NEED bosses or managers - they need us. Their rules and regulations usually hinder our work and in fact it is because we - the workers - co operate and help each other that we get the job done. If we worked to rule and followed all the regulations the result would be chaos.

Our aim in this paper is to give voice to workers who don't want to be told what to do by politicians and bureaucrats. Anarchosyndicalists are not like the militants of the left-wing parties who want to win power themselves.

We believe in SELF-MANAGEMENT, where decisions are made in meetings of workers and each person has an equal voice and equal decision making power.

Anarcho-syndicalism is also about where we live, our community. It is possible for people to meet together in neighbourhood groups to discuss and decide on issues which affect our daily lives.

For example, information about the transport needs of a community is passed on to the transport workers who have the knowledge and ability to act on that information.

The Public Transport system is under attack by the State government/Capitalist bosses and it is only a matter of time before the system breaks down completely under this pressure.

And yet, despite the attacks, Public Transport workers remain divided. We continue to struggle separately against the same problems. It is about time we came to terms with the fact that the railway workers fight is the tramway workers fight and vice-versa.

We are all afflicted with burgeoning bureaucracies that are inefficient, non-productive, and costly. More and more labour costs are being squandered on top management positions.

Staff shortages in both the railways and tramways has resulted in train and tram cancellations, station closures, overloaded vehicles, and excessive overtime with the resulting health and safety problems.

Inadequate wages forces both tramway and railway workers to work longer hours for a liveable wage. All workers have suffered close on a 10% cut in real income over the last few years. We have handed back wages and conditions won after hard struggles by workers without even questioning it. The Accord, untouchable weapon of the bosses remains a major contribution to the decline in living standards.

We are all threatened by "rationalisation", the bosses word for slashing services and cutting jobs.

The issues are the same for us all. We are all Public Transport workers. We are all under attack.

The State government cannot afford to drive us together and will continue to attack each section of the industry separately. Our union bureaucrats perpetuate the divisions, assisting the bosses in keeping us apart with demarcation disputes, petty squabbles, diversions, stalling tactics, compromises and sellouts. We cannot afford to allow them to get away with this divide and conquer policy.

It is essential that we unite as rank and file Public Transport workers to fight the cuts. We must take combined action in defence of our wages and conditions, indeed of our very jobs.

It is vital that if one section of the industry is pushed into taking industrial action, that all sections, all tramway and railway workers, take industrial action in support. An attack on one is an attack on all.

Combined and united, Public Transport workers are unbeatable. Organized together as rank and file workers, making our own decisions, our strength is enormous.

The whole system depends on us. We take

The whole system depends on us. We take the workers of other industries to their factories, their offices. We take the consumers to the business districts. We take the young to their schools.

With combined action we can stop the city and win the struggle. It is time we understood this. It is time we organized ourselves into elected shop floor committees, industry wide, free of union bureaucrats, in defence of all our interests and the interests of the communities we serve.
